Anthony Billups was 20 years old and had dreams of being a pitcher for the Major Leagues when he suddenly lost his sight. During his stay at the hospital, he couldn't see the frets on his guitar, so he felt out the few basic chords and started writing songs. After 2 months of blindness, his vision inexplicably returned. He then tried to resurrect his baseball career and received a full scholarship to Eastern Illinois University, but his heart wasn't in it. After a year, Billups moved to Nashville to study art at Cumberland University. For the past nine years he's made a living playing music and selling his art around Nashville. Anthony wrote the song, "SPECIAL" after his younger brother, Nick, was born with a rare Ring 9 chromosome disorder. Besides being a two-time Special Olympic gold medalist, Nick Billups often joins his brother to get a taste of life as a country star as he joins Anthony on stage to perform their favorite Garth Brooks songs together.
